### Hakodate

Hakodate is the third largest city on Hokkaido Island. It was one of the first two ports in Japan to open to foreign trade following the visit of Commodore Matthew Perry's "black ships" in 1853. Several western nations set up consulates in the city and many ships, especially whaling and sealing vessels, used Hakodate's port facilities. Hakodate has had a long history as a fishing port, with kelp one of its early exports. Today it remains an important fishing port and is famous for its seafood, especially tuna, salmon roe, sea urchin, crab and squid. It is also famous for its spectacular views from the top of Mount Hakodate.
